I served with John Brownlow in the same com-
pany in the expedition mentioned in his affidavit
I was taken prisoner before the battle in which he
was wounded I saw him sometime after the battle
and his wounds were desperate, he was for a long
time in such a state with his wounds that his life was
despaired of, I know that several bones were taken
from his skull, & was by near his neighbor before
the battle took place in which he was wounded, and
the said Brownlow was esteemed before receiving the said
wound and he was accounted a man of sound
intellects.
